If snoring is becoming a serious problem, the Celon method can help. Ask your ENT specialist.




Minor Cause, Major Effect

Everyone snores from time to time, it's perfectly normal, but excessive snoring can make your partner and you miserable. If the problem leads to obstructive sleep apnea (interruptions in breathing), snorers can also suffer health consequences.

Snoring is often caused by constriction of the upper respiratory tract or an enlarged or slack soft palate.


Today, these very common conditions can be treated with excellent results using minimally invasive methods.



What Your Doctor Can Do

The Celon Method

Treatment using the Celon method involves using targeted thermotherapy (only indicated for soft palate for the treatment of snoring) to reduce the size of the affected areas in the nasal passages and pharynx and stabilize the slack tissue. This means that snoring is treated directly at its source.



This minor procedure can be carried out by an ENT specialist under local anesthesia. From start to finish, the procedure generally takes no longer than 10 to 15 minutes. You can resume normal activities immediately. Recovery takes only a couple of days. There is very little discomfort afterward and you can feel a marked difference after just a few weeks. With the Celon method, you can join the thousands of patients who have received relief from the burden of excessive snoring.

Of course, the first step is to seek an exact diagnosis from your doctor and an individual treatment recommendation based on the findings.

Your Benefits

- An outpatient procedure, generally using local anesthesia.
- Brief duration of treatment is completed in just a few minutes.

Questions and Answers

Are there any side effects?

In the days following the procedure, patients may experience a foreign body sensation, slight swelling or minor pain in the treated areas. After treatment, snoring may be worse for a day or two and you may want to sleep with your head elevated.

What do I need to remember after the procedure?

While you should avoid heavy physical exertion for a few days afterwards, you don't need to restrict your daily activities in any other way. Talk to your ear, nose and throat specialist about any necessary appointments to monitor your condition.

Who performs the procedure?

Ear, nose and throat doctors who specialize in the Celon method. Talk to your healthcare provider today to see if the Celon method is suitable for you.

Are there potential complications?

Potential complications associated with the use of bipolar tissue coagulation electrodes are the same as those associated with outpatient procedures requiring anesthesia and the use of tissue coagulating radiofrequency electrodes in general. These include, but are not limited to: bleeding, infections, hematoma, injury to surrounding tissues/structures and compromise of the airway due to edema resulting from coagulation procedure if used in the upper airway.
